

INTERNATIONAL ALERTS: highlights



- MVD in Equatorial Guinée: Epicenter of outbreak in Bata, Total confirmed cases 17, 12deaths among the confirmed cases, 23 probable cases, 1427 contacts followed (WHO);
- MPOX in WHO AFRO zone: multi-countries; 80 cases since January 1st 2023, With an increase of 1.3%. The last case was notified by Nigeria for a total of 1765 cumulative cases, 22 cumulative deaths; DRC, Nigeria and Ghana have notified the highest number of cases
- > Ongoing avian influenza outbreaks in animals pose risk to humans according to a Situation analysis and advice to countries from FAO, WHO, WOAH delivered on 12 July 2023





- Cholera: 03 regions have notify new cases and deaths at EW 25;
- Yellow fever in 03 regions;
- ❖ Cholera: despite an important decrease in the number of new cases and deaths at EW 27, the outbreak is still very active with new HD touched. Constant efforts should be maintainded to put the outbreak under control; the center region is still.the epicenter of the outbreak



DISTRIBUTION OF NEW CHOLERA CASES IN AFFECTED AREAS FROM EW 25 TO EW 27

KEY data

- O3 actives régions: Center, Littoral and South
- > 18 active health districts
- 65 news cases and 3 deaths: center(58), South(1) and Littoral(5)
- 19386 cases notified
- 1887 confirmed cases by culture
- 463 deaths recorded





National Alert: Risk of spread of cholera cases in Cameroon

Gravity: 4



- ➤ There are many active HD in 05 regions (CE, LT, SO, East and WEST); 29 HD have notify cases since January 1st 2023;
- ➤ The epicenter is currently in the center region with critical alerts such as the 20 suspected cases and deaths notified by the Yaoundé Kodengui central prison;
- ➤ Water borne disease wich has increased with rains of 60-100mm accompanied by flooding along the coast (NW, South, SW, East and LT regions) and 40-60mm in the CE, West regions;
- ➤ High population density in the prisons and market places of Douala and Yaoundé which may increase the spread of the disease.
- ➤ WASH: The effectiveness of these interventions varies across the national territory, in markets, prisons and other crowded areas

 Probability: 4
- ≥ 35 confirmed cases in the course of the week with 01 death;
- > Cases have been reported in crowded places: prisons and markets that will spread rapidly
- ➤ CFR is 2.9;
- ➤ Contamination by direct contact with infected individuals;
- > Through water, contaminated food and latrines;
- > Causes severe dehydration and eventual death




- Completeness of reports 56% on the decrease specially in land and maritime border health post;
- 07 flights from Malabo with 468 passengers were the subject of special attention at the DIA in view of the epidemiological context (Marburg Disease). No suspected cases recorded.
- 02 suspected cases of cholera were notified by the BHP of Douala international airport in a flight of Ethiopian airline; 01 from Lebanon and 01 from Ethiopia. No case of COVID 19 notified despite the systematic testing at PoEs.
- **NB**: the COVID 19 systematical testing at PoE had been stop by a letter of the minister of public health issued on June 20/2023
- Insufficient ICP and necessity to ameliorate WASH mesures.






- 548 landed and 159 tested at BHP compared to 872 landed and 481 tested during the same period in 2022

- 7808 landed and 446 tested at BHP compared to 9056 landed and 8955 tested during the same period in 2022
- 01 passengers tested positive for BHP at EW 27 compared to 10 during the same period in 2022

At Epidemiological weeks 27, 10087 passengers passed through the Border Health Post, 1119 tests were performed and no covid-19 positive cases notified. Against 10123 arrived, 7750 tested and 12 positives cases during the same period in 2022.



Mapping of temperatures trend and associated health risks



From 1-10 July 2023, the temperature trend is marked by:

- ➤ The highest temperature recorded in North and far North regions. Means are around 37.1°c
- ➤ This two regions are facing a scarcity of water Induicing Risk of deshydration particularly for children and old persons
- Risks of famine and malnutrition are also present as same as the risk of résurgence of c méningitis cases
- ➤ It is also possible to observe climatic migrations of populations
- ➤ The lowest temperature are recorded in north west region 18.7°c with risk of catharh, asthma, exacerbation of pains for persons living with sicklaness blood cells and rhumatism.



précipitations Trend and associated health risks at EW 27



From 1 au 10 July 2023, the precipitations trend shows:

- > An increase of rains in South-West.
- ➤ The highest level of precipitation is 315,9 mm.
- **❖** The associated health risks are an increase in the cholera outbreak, in the number of case of vectorial and water born diseases.
- ➤ In the other side, the center and littoral regions are facing a decrease of rain with mean around 79 mm.
- ➤ The Far north region and the locality of Nanga Eboko are facing a scarcity of rain around 1,3 mm
- **❖** Populations are exposed to deshydratation and decrease in the production of crops leading to famine.




Health region with no accident notified





WHO 75th and Codex 60th anniversary of the joint FAO/WHO Codex Alimentarius programme launch on 13 July 2023 in Geneva





In 1963, following the agreement and endorsement of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and the World Health Organization (WHO), the first session of the Codex Alimentarius Commission (was convened. Member countries, and observers representing food sectors, food law and analysis, were brought together to develop the Codex Alimentarius, an international food code aimed at protecting the health of consumers and facilitating fair practices in food trade.

18 million doses of first-ever malaria vaccine allocated to 12 African countries for 2023–2025: Gavi, WHO and UNICEF on July 5th 2023





- •In response to high demand for the first-ever malaria vaccine, 12 countries in Africa will be allocated a total of 18 million doses of RTS,S/AS01 for the 2023–2025 period
- •Malaria Vaccine Implementation Programme countries Ghana, Kenya and Malawi will receive doses to continue vaccinations in pilot areas

Allocations were also made for new introductions in Benin, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Liberia, Niger, Sierra Leone and Uganda. Twelve countries across different regions in Africa are set to receive 18 million doses of the first-ever malaria vaccine over the next two years. The roll out is a critical step forward in the fight against one of the leading causes of death on the continent.

The allocations have been determined through the application of the principles outlined in the <u>Framework</u> for allocation of limited malaria vaccine supply that prioritizes those doses to areas of highest need, where the risk of malaria illness and death among children are highest.

Multilateral development banks and WHO launch new investment platform to strengthen primary health care services

In a landmark development aimed at investing in and strengthening essential, climate and crisisresilient primary health care (PHC) services in low- and low-and-middle income countries (LICs and LMICs), three multilateral development banks have joined with WHO to launch the new Health Impact Investment Platform. The Platform, launched during the Summit for a New Global Financing Pact being held in Paris, will make an initial €1.5 billion available to LICs and LMICs in concessional loans and grants to expand the reach and scope of their PHC services, especially for the most vulnerable and underserved populations and communities.

In 2011, the world reached a population of 7 billion. This year, the number will hit 8 billion, prompting the attendant responses. Some will marvel at the advancements in health that have extended <u>lifespans</u>, reduced <u>maternal mortality</u> and <u>child mortality</u> and given rise to vaccine development in record time. Others will tout technological innovations that have eased our lives and connected us more than ever. Still others will herald gains in <u>gender equality</u>.

But progress is not universal, throwing inequality into razorsharp relief. The same concerns and challenges raised 11 years ago remain or have worsened: Climate change, violence, discrimination. The world reached a particularly grim milestone in May: More than 100 million forcibly displaced worldwide. During the period from 2000 to 2020, even though the global population grew at an average annual rate of 1.2%. In an ideal world, 8 billion people means 8 billion opportunities for healthier societies empowered by rights and choices. But the playing field is not and has never been even. Based on gender, ethnicity, class, religion, sexual orientation, disability and origin, among other factors, too many are still exposed to discrimination, harassment and violence.
